What has been accomplished

- Standard sign in sheet for medical students so a list can be owned by all three med-peds organizations and engage/track students
- Updated Match slides and Speaker's Kit
- Work with AAP Med-Peds section and NMPRA in student activities

Currently in the works

- Shadowing pilot for students
- Recruitment Handbook chapter
- Visits to schools without Med-Peds programs
- New Med-Peds programs and expansion of others

- Med-Peds is viewed as a more competitive specialty
 - Increase in applications per applicant has grown much faster than applicants
 - Fueled by misinformation, often from "trusted" advisors
 - Leads to unnecessary anxiety among applicants
 - Increased workload at program level to sift through applicants
 - <u>Create general guidelines to assist medical students in application and interview process</u>
 - Tool to help applicant assess his/her "competitiveness"
 - <u>Suggest students seek nearby Program Director early for</u> <u>triage</u>
 - <u>Provide guidelines to medical school Deans, NMPRA, Med-</u> <u>Peds student interest groups and Student Doctor Network</u>

- 2015 AAMC graduation survey showed that none of 219 graduates entering Med-Peds had considered Med-Peds as their primary career choice prior to medical school
 - Call to action to enhance recruitment activities at medical school level
 - Focus on new schools, medical schools placing few Med-Peds applicants into the Match, and schools without Med-Peds programs
 - Need to focus on decline in osteopathic student interest
 - Suggest that prospective students interface with NMPRA, email: <u>info@medpeds.org</u> for access to quarterly newsletter

- Post-interview communication
 - Programs have generally adopted "strategic" communication
 - A "no pos-tinterview communication" policy is likely too restrictive and hinders the small, family-centric nature of Med-Peds programs
 - Suggest programs review "Residency Post-interview Communications: More Harm Than Good?" from *Journal of Graduate Medical Education*, February 1, 2016

- ERAS "Ranks to fill" reporting
 - "Ranks to fill" reporting is voluntary
 - Potential liability to make Med-Peds programs look bad compared to other primary care or categorical programs
 - Suggest programs request DIO to not report "ranks to fill"
